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Prologue

The present work contains records of the Christian Arabic Bible translations and Bible commentaries that are kept at the Department of Asian and African Studies at the British Library. Many of these manuscripts have previously been described in various catalogues, yet with different levels of detail. The main problem, however, for those interested in the material is to find and navigate through all these catalogues in order to get an overview of the corpus. As a means of enabling access to such an overview, Stocks and Baker published a Subject-Guide to the Arabic manuscripts at the British Library in 2001, where shelfmarks are arranged according to genre and where references to their respective catalogues are provided and point to the microfiches of the manuscripts that were produced by Brill in 2001. The Subject-Guide has been an important step forward in making the collections easier to navigate and the present catalogue builds on this important initiative. In contrast to the Subject-Guide, the present work is limited to a specific genre, Christian Arabic Bible translations. In addition, it includes a higher number of items and incorporates data into the work, allowing it to be used both as a guide and a catalogue. The present work also aims at systematizing and updating codicological and content-related information about these valuable sources, many of which have previously been described only by title and approximate date and some, which have not yet been catalogued. Finally, the present work includes sample images of the manuscripts it describes as well as indices over scribes, commissioners, dating systems, immediate sources of acquisition, etc.

PREVIOUS CATALOGUES AND SELECTED STUDIES

In the present work, relevant records from printed Arabic, Syriac, and Coptic catalogues, as well as the handwritten acquisition registers, have been compared and collated. As mentioned above, the codicological and content-related information included in these catalogues and registers differ greatly. The most detailed catalogues of Christian Arabic Bible translations are Cureton and Rieu's multi-volume work *Catalogus codicum manuscriptorum orientalium*, published between 1846 and 1871, which contains a number of rather well known and impressive manuscripts, followed by Rieu's *Supplement to the Catalogue of the Arabic Manuscripts in the British Museum* in 1894. In 1912, Ellis and Edwards

published A Descriptive List of the Arabic Manuscripts Acquired by the Trustees of the British Museum since 1894, which includes an additional couple of Christian Arabic Bible translations that are described in brief. Almost half of the corpus covered in the present catalogue are found in bilingual Coptic-Arabic manuscripts and described in the Catalogue of the Coptic Manuscripts published by Crum in 1905 and the Catalogue of Coptic Literary Manuscripts by Layton from 1987. Some Arabic translations are paralleled with Syriac renditions and others are written in Karshūnī script, and thus found in Rosen and Forshall's Catalogus codicum manuscriptorum orientalium from 1838, Margoliouth's Descriptive List of Syriac and Karshuni MSS. from 1899, and Wright's Catalogue of Syriac Manuscripts published in 1870. In 2020, Brock published his Inventory of Published Syriac Texts from the British Library, with the ambition to, among other things, gather all Syriac manuscripts in the same work. A few Arabic Bible manuscripts are included in the catalogue of mainly Islamic manuscripts published in 1877 by Loth, A Catalogue of the Arabic Manuscripts in the Library of the India Office. A notable number of previously uncatalogued manuscripts were finally referenced in Stocks and Baker' Subject Guide. A few manuscripts remained listed only in the handwritten records of the British Library, i.e. Oriental Mss. Classified Inventory, vol. 1, and corresponding volumes of the *Lists of Oriental Manuscripts* records.

The aim of the present work has thus been to include all the manuscripts at the Asian and African Studies Department, which include continuous versions of Arabic Bible translations used by Christians, as well as exegetical works, where the biblical text is included in full. In addition, it provides several examples of Gospel lectionaries in Arabic. However, since the borders between biblical and liturgical material is not always clear in the records and since bilingual manuscripts sometimes only contain rubrics in Arabic, the present catalogue does not aim at including all lectionaries.

As mentioned above, the present catalogue also aims at systematizing codicological and content-related information on manuscripts transmitting Christian Arabic Bible translations. A substantial portion of this corpus has hardly been described at all, whereas other texts have received more or less thorough attention. This means that in some cases the present catalogue adds only sparse codicological information, such as the presence of catchwords and quire marks to complement previous records, whereas in other cases, basic information regarding the manuscripts is provided for the first time. Instead of elaborating on paleography

and other visual elements in writing, all but one shelfmark (where the fragment is framed in glass) are accompanied by at least one image of the manuscripts. In addition, information on particular Bible versions contained in these manuscripts is included. The latter is based on the increasing number of studies that have accumulated during the last decades, which aim at identifying the many different versions of biblical books in Arabic. Most important for the British Library collections are Kashouh's extensive categorization of Gospel translations, *The Arabic* Versions of the Gospels, published in 2012; Zaki's study on Pauline Epistles, The Pauline Epistles in Arabic from 2021, and Vollandt's monograph on Pentateuch renditions, *Arabic Versions of the Pentateuch* from 2015. In the entries below, the categorisation system found in these works is used. For example, Vollandt and Zaki use *Vorlage* + the sequential number, thus a Pauline Epistle categorized as Arab^{Syr}3 means that the Arabic translation in the ms belongs to the third earliest attested Arabic recension from Syriac. Besides the understudied corpus of Psalm translations, these are the three most widely reproduced parts of the Bible among Christian Arabic-speakers during late antique and mediaeval times. In addition to these works, studies of less frequently produced biblical books, as well as editions and a selection of studies relating to individual manuscripts or authors, scribes, and translators of works included in the corpus, have also been consulted to establish its content and are thus listed in Selected Studies below.

STRUCTURE OF THE PRESENT WORK

The manuscripts are sorted into five major parts (A–E), which are normally further subdivided into collections and individual books. Each subcategory is internally arranged according to presumed date, with the exception that individual books are placed after collections of books and arranged in the order they appear in the Bible. Thus, an early copy of Deuteronomy is placed after a later copy of Numbers and both are placed after a modern copy of the entire Pentateuch. Furthermore, an explicit date goes before an approximate date if they are both dated to the same century. Thus, a manuscript dated 1795 CE is placed before a manuscript given the approximate date range 18th c.

The first part (A) contains larger collections of biblical works, typically including works from the Hebrew Bible, the New Testament, and/or so-called deuterocanonical books. These manuscripts are of rather late date (from late 16th century and onwards). The second part (B) contains books from the Hebrew Bible/

Christian Old Testament and are in essence arranged according to their positions in Eastern Christian traditions. The second part is further subdivided into: 1) larger or mixed collections of books; 2) the Pentateuch; 3) Psalms and Odes; 4) Wisdom literature; and 5) Prophets. The relatively large production of the Pentateuch, Psalters, and to a lesser degree, Prophets, reveals the preferences for certain books at the expense of others in these communities. Most notably, there is a meager representation of so-called historical books in our corpus, which appear only in larger collections. The third part (C), Deuterocanonical Books, is for ease of reference separated from the Hebrew Bible/Old Testament, although these books were transmitted as integral parts of the Bible in most manuscripts. Several of these works are included in larger collections as well and books such as Ben Sira, the Wisdom of Solomon, and the Additions to Daniel, are more widely reproduced than many proto-canonical books. The reader who wishes to get an overview of the production of a specific biblical book, is thus referred to the index of biblical books at the end of the catalogue. The fourth part (D) consists of New Testament translations and are subdivided into: 1) Gospels; 2) Gospel lectionaries; 3) Acts and Epistles, and 4) Revelation. Although Acts often occurs after the Epistles in Arabic manuscripts, this book is for ease of reference placed before them in the present catalogue. The reader should also note that not all lectionaries at the British Library have been included, for the reasons mentioned above. In the fifth and final part (E), Bible commentaries that contain running versions of the biblical texts are included.

DATING SYSTEMS AND UNDATED MANUSCRIPTS

Five different calendars are found in the corpus (here as described in Stocks and Baker' *Subject Guide*, ix). The most frequently used system is that of the Coptic Martyrs, Anno Martyrum, which begun 29 Aug, 284 CE. Only a little less frequent is the use of the Hijra calendar, which began 16 July 622 CE. A number of manuscripts use both the Anno Martyrum and the Hijra calendars. A handful of manuscripts use the Seleucid Era, which began 1 Oct 312 BCE, and an equal number reference the Years of Adam, i.e., Byzantine Greek Era, which began 1 Sep 5509 BCE. Western calendars (Julian and Gregorian) appear in a few manuscripts. For more on specific manuscripts, see the index on calendars, where dates included in colophons (but not in readers' notes etc) are listed.

Many manuscripts in the corpus are undated. In the present catalogue, an approximate date is provided for these manuscripts, based on a combination of codicological data drawn from dated manuscripts. Approximate dates should always be taken with care since regional practice or personal preference may affect the production of manuscripts. Yet, providing an approximate date to undated manuscripts may help research on these texts to proceed and where possible, a broad date range has thus been included. If an approximate date was provided in an older catalogue or in a study, it has been kept unless codicological data suggests revision.

In general, the earliest manuscripts were made from Oriental paper (or parchment) and sorted with the help of numbered quires. Later, catchwords were introduced as a means of ensuring that the manuscript was correctly bound or rebound and Western (ruled and often brighter) paper was increasingly taking over the market. For a long period, these practices were applied in parallel, and sometimes, especially in Coptic-Arabic manuscripts, used in one and the same manuscript. For instance, in the present corpus the combination of catchwords, quire marks, and Western paper is rather frequent and occurs in dated manuscripts between 1585 CE and 1826 CE. Based on these findings, Or. 8788, Or. 8787, Or. 8790, and Or. 423 are given the date range 16th – 19th c. The quite common combination of catchwords and Western paper (without quire marks) occurs in manuscripts dated 1609-1610 CE and onwards. Thus, Or. 11553, Or. 11554, and Or. 11334 are given the range date 17th-19th c. The combination of catchwords, quires, and Oriental paper occurs between 1416 CE and 1671/2 CE, which indicates that Or. 5918, previously dated to the 13th-14th c., should instead be dated to 14th-15th c. (in addition, the year 1770 Seleucid Era = 1459 CE included in this manuscript, may in fact be a colophon). The combination of quire marks and Oriental paper occurs between 1188 CE and 1332 CE, thus Or. 8795, Or. 8793, and Or. 8794, which exhibit other late features as well, are dated to the 14th c. Fragments are especially difficult to date since they often lack margins where catchwords and quire marks are to be found, yet as a means to provide an approximate guideline, the combination Oriental paper without catchwords is most common around 12th-14th c. and the following fragments are given the somewhat broader date range 12th-15th c.: Or. 5638 (1), Or. 1242 (2), Add. 19902 (fols. 29-32), Or. 1242 (3), Add. 14740 (B), Or. 5638 (2), Or. 1242 (4), Or. 5642 (1), and Or. 1242 (5). Add. 14740 (A),

which includes quire marks, is given the date 12th-14th c. For the same reason, Or. 1001 is dated to the 14th c.

Date range: Several dates, ranging from 1301 Anno Martyrum (=1585 CE) to

1306 Anno Martyrum (=1590 CE).

Extent/format: Codex (vertical); 326 fols.

Contents: The copy contains the second of two volumes of the Bible (cf. fol. 1r). The second volume is probably extant in Coptic Orthodox Patriarchate, Bible 32. In addition to the biblical books themselves, several prefaces are included. The codex contains the renditions by some known translators, including al-'Alam's translations of Daniel and Ezekiel, Pethion's version of Job, al-Harith's version of the Wisdom of Solomon, the Gospels according to the version by Hibat Allah b. al-'Assāl, the introduction to the Gospels structured according to the 'seven isagogical questions', composed by Sim'an b. Kalīl, and the Pauline Epistles according to the Egyptian Vulgate (Arab^{Syr}3). For these classifications, see relevant works in Selected Studies.




















Illustration 19. © From the British Library Collection. Add. 14740 (B), fol. 1v. Photo by the author.




Illustration 20. © From the British Library Collection. Add. 19902, fol. 29v.




Illustration 21. © From the British Library Collection. Or. 1242 (2), fol. 9v. Photo by the author.










Illustration 26. © From the British Library Collection. Arundel Or. 15, fol. 38v.

















phon, we also learn that the text in the Arabic column was transcribed from a copy by Patriarch Anba Yūnus, from the translation made by the 'learned [al-'Alam] Alexandrian priest', who translated from Greek to Arabic and revised it in line with Coptic. The commissioner is named Yūḥannā b. Sa'īd al-Dawla. For transcriptions, see Rieu, *Supplement*, 4–5.















On fol. 67r, it is written that Mark was finished on Tuesday (sic) 13 *Kīyahk* in the year 997 Anno Martyrum/15 Shaʿbān 679 Hijra (=16 Dec 1280 CE); on fol. 109r, that Luke was finished on Monday 20 *Kīyahk* in the year 997 Anno Martyrum/22 Shaʿbān 679 Hijra (=23 Dec 1280 CE), and on fol. 140v that John was finished on Tuesday 28 *Kīyahk* the year 997 Anno Martyrum (=31 Dec 1280 CE)/27 (sic) Shaʿbān 679 Hijra (=28 Dec 1280 CE) and, in another hand, that it was copied from a copy by Anba Akhristāṭalū who was active during the time of Patriarch Kīrillus Laqlaq. The latter two dates do not agree and the Anno Martyrum date is likely correct since it falls on a Tuesday. In general, the years are difficult to read and in such cases, we follow the transcriptions in Cureton and Rieu, *Catalogus*, 10–11.



The note states that the ms was copied from what a certain deacon Abū Isḥaq found in a copy from 94o Anno Martyrum/622 Hijra (= 1224/5 CE) and from 26 Amshīr 936 Anno Martyrum (= 28 Feb 1220 CE). A note on fol. 116v gives an account of the collation process that took place in the production of the ms where the scribe claims superiority of the copied text. 




Illustration 60. @ From the British Library Collection. Or. 1327, fol. 186r. Photo by the author.






Illustration 62. © From the British Library Collection. Add. 11856, fol. 59r. Photo by the author.










Illustration 70. © From the British Library Collection. Or. 1317, fol. 2r. Photo by the author.




Illustration 71. © From the British Library Collection. Or. 1317, fol. 10v. Photo by the author.




Illustration 73. $^{\circ}$ From the British Library Collection. Or. 1242 (4), fol. 16r. Photo by the author.




Illustration 74. © From the British Library Collection. Or. 8793, fol. 1r. Photo by the author.











Gabriel III), when he was still only a priest and it is mentioned that he invested much work in correcting the Greek and the Arabic. It was provided for by Abū Shākir b. al-Sannā (> Sanā'?) al-rāhib b. al-Muhadhdhib. It was completed in 10 Kīyahk 966 Anno Martyrum (=13 Dec 1249 CE), corresponding to Ramadan 647 Hijra. He states that the present copy was completed on Saturday 9 Bāba 1024 Anno Martyrum (=15 Oct 1307 CE), corresponding to 7 Second Rabī'a 707 Hijra (=13 Oct 1307 CE). The former falls on a Saturday and is seemingly the correct date. In connection to the Catholic Epistles and Acts on fol. 217v, the scribe mentions that this part of the ms was originally made from a copy by Jurja b. Saksīk, 'the famous scribe' and then copied by Ghabriyāl, who took great care in correcting it, and that it was provided for

by Abū Shakīr. That copy was completed on 10 *Kīyahk* 966 Anno Martyrum (=13 Dec 1249 CE), corresponding to Ramaḍān 647 Hijra. The present part was made from that copy and finished on Thursday 28 Bāba 1024 Anno Martyrum (=3 Nov 1307 CE), which equals 26 Second Rabīʻa 707 Hijra (=1 Nov 1307 CE) by Abū Saʻīd b. Sayyid al-Dār b. Abū al-Faḍl. Again, the Coptic date seems to be correct, as it falls on a Thursday.

The colophons are transcribed and translated in Horner, *The Coptic Version*, vol. 3, xi-xiii.


























Illustration 108. © From the British Library Collection. Arundel Or. 4, fol. 1r. Photo by the author.




Illustration 110. © From the British Library Collection. Or. 11575, fol. 2r (paper part). Photo by the author.




